1st International Mentoring Conference: (IMeC): Promoting Mentoring Culture July 19-21, 2018 University of Asia and the Pacific, Pasig City, Philippines.

The International Mentoring Conference (IMeC) organized by the University of Asia and the Pacific is set on July 19-21, 2018. The theme for this year's conference is *Promoting Mentoring Culture*. The program will be comprised of keynote speeches, paper presentations and workshops related to the theme. We have invited internationally known mentoring experts and authors, Dr. W. Brad Johnson, Ms. Ann Rolfe and Dr. Jean Rhodes, who will bring participants new insights on how to create, promote, and sustain a mentoring culture based on their own practice and research work. To further enrich the discussions, there will be presentations on various successful mentoring initiatives by Dr. Severina Villegas and Dr. Gabby Dy-Liacco. Research paper presentations on mentoring practices and programs in academic, business, and community settings will be held on the succeeding days.

Call for papers has been opened to accept abstracts of completed or proposed research connected to any of the topic areas listed below, or related areas:



mentorships, the benefits of mentoring, and recent evidence about frequency and efficacy of	
mentoring in higher education. The keynote will also address obstacles to mentoring, honest	
costs to mentors, and the challenges of evaluating and building mentoring competence. Some	
lingering tensions in the mentoring literature will be addressed, including the relative benefits	
of formal versus informally evolving relationships and the value of a primary mentor versus a	- 4
developmental network of career helpers. Finally, this keynote will offer some mentoring	
strategies for both streamlining mentor time and amplifying the prevalence of mentoring in an	
institution. These strategies are designed to further a self-perpetuating culture of mentorship.

This practical workshop provides evidence-based rules of engagement for developing high-impact mentoring relationships in Higher Education and other organizations. Topics include the interpersonal qualities and behavior strategies of highly-effective "Master" mentors, techniques for forming effective mentorships, and key ethical obligations and considerations. The habits and behaviors of truly effective mentees will also be covered. There will be a strong focus on using mentorships to leverage inclusion and diversity with particular focus on gender and race. Cultural humility and egalitarian values in the context of mentoring relationships will be emphasized. This session is also dedicated to helping participants think in an informed way about the key ingredients to a strong mentoring culture. This workshop will include the opportunity to practice some vital mentoring techniques.

DR. JEAN RHODES is a leading expert on youth mentoring research, and the depth, breadth, and rigor of her academic accomplishments have made important contributions to policies affecting children and youth. Rhodes is the Frank L. Boyden Professor of Psychology and the director of the Center for Evidence-based Mentoring at UMass Boston. Rhodes has published her findings in outlets ranging from scholarly journals to OpEds in *The New York Times* and *The Boston Globe*. Her trade book, *Stand by Me: The*

Risks and Rewards of Mentoring Today's Youth (Harvard University Press), served to galvanize an emerging field. Rhodes launched longitudinal research on natural mentoring relationships with urban adolescents, deepening our understanding of the changing nature of relationships and their positive influence on an array of outcomes.



DR. SEVERINA M. VILLEGAS specializes in character, moral & values education, and mentoring. She pioneered in establishing several educational Institutions, such as the Schools for Women in Home Management – Punlaan, which spawned other schools in Metro Manila, Laguna, Cebu, and Ilolio. Another is the Center for Research and Communication (College of Arts and Sciences), which paved the way to the University of Asia and the Pacific (UA&P), as well as the School of Education (MA in Values

Education). Aside from this, she does consultancy work in PAREF, UA&P, DepED and other sectors here and abroad, particularly in Macao and Singapore. Dr. Villegas has also delivered papers on Education and Human Development in several countries, which includes Scotland, Spain, Hongkong, Macau, Taiwan, Beijing, etc.



DR. GABRIEL DY-LIACCO holds a Ph.D. in Pastoral Counseling from Loyola University Maryland. Pastoral counseling is a unique discipline that blends professional counseling and psychotherapy with a carefully integrated spiritual dimension. His clinical work is in the treatment of individuals, couples, families and groups for a wide range of issues. These include adult and childhood abuse and trauma, psychiatric diagnoses, personality disorders, addiction, and non-psychiatric problems in living. He

is a licensed professional counselor and has practiced psychotherapy and counseling in various mental health settings since 1997. Dr. Dy-Liacco is an Associate Professor in the School of Psychology and Counseling of Regent University in Virginia, USA. He has also taught in the Department of Pastoral Counseling of Loyola University Maryland. He is an associate editor of the journal, *Psychology of Religion and Spirituality*, of the American Psychological Association. His own research focuses on the relationships among faith, spiritual experience, spiritual struggles, and psychological flourishing. In the Philippines, he maintains a private clinical practice, provides organizational consulting for educational institutions, and conducts workshops for religious formators. In December 17, 2014, Pope Francis appointed Dr. Dy-Liacco to the Pontifical Commission for the Protection of Minors as the representative for the Asian Region.
